Publisher's Comments by Mark Linnemann

They've been to the last six USSSA Men's Class "B" World Tournaments, and captured two Great Lakes National Championships, four Ohio State titles, and nineteen National Invitational Tournaments in the last five years. And in the last four years, they've been ranked number one in the state, no worse than third in the Great Lakes Division, and no worse than sixth in the nation.

'The only question is: are they a "B" team?

"They" is Freeze Concrete/James S. Arnold/JAC/Putter's Tavern - arguably the most successful team in the nation to continue to play at the same level over an extended period of time.

Some called Freeze the consumate "B" team.

Others call them sandbaggers.

Which one of these long-standing positions is a myth?

In all likelihood, every team in the tri-state, and no doubt many across the country, have played the "Freeze" card when they've been moved up by state or national by-laws, or at the discretion of their director. "How come Freeze never has to move up," they whine, implying that USSSA has a double standard. The moaning is even further exacerbated when the team being moved up is a "C" team. "We can't compete with Freeze," they protest.

Consequently, the name "Freeze" leaves a bad taste in the mouth of many directors, who have probably had the team name thrown up in their faces on more than one occasion.

So just how has this team been able to dodge the "reclassification bullet" through the years?

In reality, they haven't - completely, that is. In 2000, Freeze finished tied for fifth in the USSSA "B" world, which at the time sentenced them to play "A" the following year - which they did. After failing dismally to compete at the "A" level, they returned to "B" in 2001, and finished ninth at the World. The next year they finished seventh, and were accused of throwing the fifth place game, which would have made them an "A" team the following year. One could argue they should have been an "A" team on paper after that episode, but an 0-2 record at the 2003 "B" World hardly indicted them as an "A" team on the field.

After going 1-2 in the 2004 World, Freeze placed fourth in 2005, and it is widely believed the team was on the brink of disbanding when, out of the blue, USSSA changed its by-laws two months later to only require the winner of the "B" World to move up the following year.

Of course this just added fuel to the fire among teams who were protesting their being reclassified for 2006, especially among those in the "C" and "D" programs. After all, they were being reclassified because they finished in the top ten percent at their respective world tournaments, which was the magic number in the men's "B," "C," "D" and "E" programs in the 2005 USSSA by-laws. In their eyes, it was simple: they were being moved up, Freeze wasn't. Naturally, the cried "foul."

The Freeze "reign of terror" continued throughout the 2006 season. Despite solid local competition from teams like the Storm, Pure Romance, Graystone Mortgage and A & K Tile, Freeze was as dominant as ever in Greater Cincinnati, winning five NIT's despite sitting out the first one and placing second to the Storm in the next. Adding insult to injury, they finished fifth in the 43-team U-Trip Major NIT in July, ahead of six "A" teams. Local clubs got a reprieve in August, when Freeze opted to play in the "A" World rather than notch its fifth state state title. But Freeze went into a swoon in September, placing fifth in the Great Lakes Nationals and ninth in the World.

Ironically, area "B" teams - even those competing at that level for the first year in 2007 - don't begrudge Freeze's playing in the "B" program.

Tom Richmond, whose Loveless Hardwood/Conveyor Solutions/Minges Drywall/A Total Tan/Easton/Noe's Plumbing Supply team voluntarily moved up the "B" level this year, points out a very important consideration. "They've been playing together for awhile, and that makes a big difference."

Indeed. When Freeze has been dominant, it's been largely at the local level, and always when established "B" teams are nowhere to be found. When Lucke Homes and EMR stayed together for more than one season, which seems to be the lifetime of the average "B" team in the area, they gave Freeze fits. Back in the Lucke-EMR era of 2002 and 2003, Freeze only won a total of three NIT's, and failed to win the state tournament either season. This should be a lesson to any team: if you have a rough season your first year at a new level, suck it up. You'll get better, but not if you throw in the towel after only one year.

Mike Foulks, whose Mike Foulks Auto Body/Team Insanity/Easton team also played "C" last year but has been reclassified to "B" by the USSSA national by-laws, says he used to question Freeze's "B" rating, but not any more.

"In the past few seasons, I have grown to realize Freeze is just a solid 'B' team," says Foulks. "There is always going to be someone at the top to try to beat, whether they are a local team or an out of town team."

Robert "Red" Moore, whose teams competed almost exclusively in the ASA and NSA programs over the past several years, and last year at the "A" level, has thrown his hat into the ring to compete locally at the U-Trip "B" level this year with his

Boombah/TPS/Classic Car Wash/Red's club. Moore says that he not only doesn't mind playing Freeze, he wants to model his team after them.

"They've got the chemistry and the base hitting and they just play smart," says Moore. "I want my team to do what they do.

"They're right where they should be," he continues. "I don't think they're an 'A' team by any means."

"Why are they the only team that seems to be scrutinized," asks Tom Nicolaus, whose Community Cab team joined the USSSA "B" program last year. "They have put themselves into a position that they are the standard that everybody else has to beat. They're a good team. If you want to play at that level, get ready to beat them. Last year was the first time we ever beat them. Maybe they had a bad game, and we had a good game."

Like Community Cab, Blitz/Watanabe/TTP/Wessel/A & K/Easton also joined the USSSA "B" circuit in 2006.

"Freeze plays the 'B' game very well, and more teams should aspire to play like that," says Blitz manager Terry Walton. "I have no problem with their playing 'B' because at the 'B' level, you should expect to see teams the caliber of Freeze.

"There is no doubt that Freeze has been the best 'B' team in the city for many years now," adds Walton. "But if you're going to say that they're an 'A' team, it goes beyond what is happening in our city. First of all, if a team is going to play at the 'A' level, they have to have the means and ability and the sponsorship to be able to travel. There aren't many 'A' teams, so (to play "A") it would require an awful lot of travel. This is still a hobby and that's a big commitment for guys to travel to play every weekend."

While USSSA can't classify teams based on their budgets, but must instead look at their ability, Walton has touched on an important point by using the word "ability." Does Freeze have the "ability" to play "A?"

In many parts of the country, including Greater Cincinnati, USSSA has been utilizing "player lists" to aid in classifying teams. Locally, for example, if a team has more than four "D" players, the team would be required to play "D." Applying this formula to Freeze, we can ask: do they have enough "A" players to play "A?"

The answer? Hardly.

At best, one could argue that returning slugger Jon Jamison, who was class "B" Player of the Year with Freeze in 2005 before leaving for PRI last season, is an "A" player. That being said, bear in mind Jamison failed to make even the "B" All-City team last year. Of the Freeze players who made the 2006 "Open" All-City team, only Bob Noeth and George Farris return. Both are fine ball players, but if either Noeth or Farris - or Jamison - is an "A" player, why would they be playing "B," when "A" teams are generally believed to pay their players? The career histories of all three players have been at the "B" level. These are veteran players. If they're capable of playing regularly at the "A" leve, why haven't "A" teams grabbed these guys up?

Freeze manager Homer Matheny says there is a virtual chasm between "A" and "B" teams, not just in budgets but in personnel.

"We played a lot of 'A' teams last year," says Matheny. "We played in two Major NIT's and the 'A' World, and we're playing against teams that have budgets of over \$100,000 and paying their players. And there is a total gap between 'A' teams and 'B' teams. There are only fifteen or sixteen 'A' teams in the country, and it's hard for me to consider our team as one of the best in the country. I'm not saying we're not good, but we don't have anyone personnel-wise to be lumped in that group of elite teams. Can we play with them and beat them once in awhile? Yes. But as far as talent and payroll, it's night and day. We're just a good local 'B' team.

"Jon Jamison is definitely an elite player, but that's really about it," argues Matheny regarding the strength of his roster. "We don't try to go out and pick up 'A' players from other teams. We really look for a well-rounded, solid 'B' player who can play defense and hit for power and be a team player. We're not into picking up superstars and all-stars who are used to getting paid. For budget and chemistry reasons, those are not the people we're out there trying to pick up. And because of that, we have stayed a pretty solid, low-budget 'B' team.

"A lot of it comes down to intangibles," adds Matheny. "It's not necessarily how many home runs you hit, or whether you make the all-city team, or who starts and who doesn't. It comes down to building a couple of years of experience and the intangibles and chemistry take over and you become successful once you get a taste of what's expected of you to win. We've built a nucleus of players and have tried to mix and match good people who have added good chemistry to a good team, and some years it works, and some years it hasn't."

Matheny is right. There is no comparison between the transition from "B" to "A" versus the transition from "E" to "D," "D" to "C," or "C" to "B." "A" teams are permitted five USSSA "Major Players." "B" teams are limited to one. Freeze has none. And regionally and nationally, Freeze is already competing against teams with several "A" players. Freeze has one - at best.

So the long-standing myth that Freeze is an "A" team?

Busted.

The USSSA "B" World: All Local Teams Will Qualify, But Do They Have What It Takes To Win?

There are no fewer than seven "B" NIT's slated for Greater Cincinnati in 2007, and another two less than an hour away in Dayton. The top ranked team in Ohio and Kentucky win a berth, as does every team that earns 1,000 points. Another berth is available in the Ohio USSSA "B" State, two at the "B" Nationals and one in the USSSA "Major" NIT in July. So without ever leaving town and without accumulating 1,000 points, there are still a minimum of eleven world berths available for the eight "B" teams in Greater Cincinnati

So the question going into the 2007 season for area "B" teams isn't whether they will qualify for the World, but rather, will they be able to compete once they get there? And just what does it take to be competitive at the "B" World?

Certainly Greater Cincinnati teams have shown their ability to compete at the "B" World. Over the last five years the twenty-five teams that have made the trip have compiled a respectable 44-50 record.

And perhaps no team in the nation has been there more often than Freeze/James Arnold/JAC/Putter's Tavern, a participant in an approximately ten U-Trip "B" Worlds. They've been 5-2 each of the last two Septembers after suffering through a 1-2 record in 2004 and going 0-2 in 2003.

So team manager Homer Matheny can speak with some authority on what it takes to be competitive once a team gets to Disney's Wide World of Sports in Lake Buena Vista, Fl. - the site of this year's event.

"You have to have a consistent line-up," states Matheny. "You can't have any weaknesses in your line-up. We've had decent years there but have had a few weaknesses in the line-up in the World and you can't afford to have any. You need to have a strong top-to-bottom line-up offensively.

"Pitching, defense and team players" are also vital, says Matheny.

"You need to have unselfish players when it comes to using your home runs wisely and knowing the right time to hit one of your four home runs."

Matheny says teams also need to catch some breaks.

"It's always important to have the ball bouince your way a few times, and to win the tough games and stay in the winners' bracket."

Being "mentally and physically prepared" is another key, says Matheny.

"The 'B' World strains teams physically," he says. "Teams aren't used to playing late Saturday games and early Sunday games in 'B' NIT's. But with the number of teams and the heat in Florida, plus the quick turnaround time, it can be difficult to contend with if you're not prepared. This is an especially big factor on championship Sunday at the 'B' World."

"Consistency is the name of the game in any World Tournament," agrees Terry Walton, manager of Blitz/Watanabe/TTP/Wessel/A & K/Easton.

'With the low home run totals, it puts more emphasis on defense and how you manufacture runs without hitting home runs. That's very important."

Competing in their first USSSA "B" World, the Blitz went 0-2, which Walton attributes to a lack of "focus.

"I felt last year we lost our focus by the time we got to the end of the season," says Walton. "You have to maintain focus and drive throughout the season.

"With seven new players and fourteen on the team, I'm going to have to do my job to put this team in a position to win by putting the best eleven out there offensively and defensively," Walton continues. "A lot of time with a new team it takes a while to find that right combination where guys play defensively and where they bat. And hopefully by the end of the season, we'll have those players in the best position to help our team win. That's a manager's job.

"And on the players side," adds Walton, "they have to learn to maintain that drive and keep themselves motivated because it's a long season. They have to realize they're not going there for a vacation, but to try to win a World title."

Community Cab/Marty's Pub/Easton, another team that played in its first U-Trip "B" World last season, only went 1-2. But they could have done better, insists manager Tom Nicolaus.

"We're going to have to use our home runs more wisely since you're only allowed four. And we'll have to have the consistent hitting to back that up, and don't make errors in the field. It's as simple as that," says Nicolaus.

"That was our problem. We didn't hit consistently in our second loss, and if we hadn't hit solo home runs, we would have had a better chance to win in our first loss," says Nicolaus. "We only lost by one run and we still scored seventeen runs and had four solo home runs. It's all about execution and timely hitting and we didn't do that last year when we lost. But when we won, we did. "We weren't outclassed," says Nicolaus. "We definitely have a team that can compete in that type of tournament. We had tournaments in which we beat teams that were better than us, but in other tournaments we didn't.

"You can't his solo home runs when other teams are hitting three run home runs," he continues. "You have to execute, hit back side and hit the gaps, and you can't waste opportunities. When we lost in big games, we did that often."

Experience is also a big factor, explains Nicolaus.

"For almost everybody on our team, it was the first world tournament we had ever been to. You have to learn what it takes to win. And that's what we're trying to do."

Tom Richmond, manager of Loveless Hardwood/Conveyer Solutions/Minges Drywall/A Total Tan/Easton/Noel's Plumbing Supply, has taken his teams to the last two USSSA World Tournaments - but not at the "B" level.

Two years ago in the "C" World, Loveless went 6-2 and finished 13th. Last year they were 1-2 and 65th. In spite of their poor showing last September, the team has voluntarily elected to play "B" in 2007.

"You really have to have a solid team," says Richmond. "I've found that when you go the World, other areas let teams play down a lot. I found that in the 'C' World, you have to have a good, solid, powerful team to make a showing at the 'B' level.

"We'll have to hit and basically make the routine plays in the field to win our games," says Richmond. "But the main thing is the hitting aspect. If you can't score fifteen to twenty runs a game, you're probably going to be in trouble. I also think pitching plays a big part in the success of your team. You have to be solid and be on your game."

Robert "Red" Moore of Boombah/TPS/Classic Car Wash/Red's of Northern Kentucky hopes to take a team to his first USSSA World this year. He believes primarily tht "teamwork and chemistry," will bring success.

"If you're only allowed four home runs, you're not going to be winning with home runs," predicts Moore. "We're just looking forward to the competition. We don't mind playing the big boys - it's the only way to get better. If they're athletes, they're going to find a way to win."

Mike Foulks Auto Body/Team Insanity/Easton/Boombah softball team of Northern Kentucky finished 9th in the USSSA "C" World in Michigan last year, and is being forced up to "B."

But while playing "B" teams won't be anything new for Team Insanity, sponsor-manager Mike Foulks just doesn't feel like his team is ready for a steady diet of it. "We try to play in all the upper level tournaments available to us in this local area," sais Foulks. "And we have had some success. But I believe there is a difference mentally when playing higher caliber teams. When we go out and play teams like Freeze, Blitz, Graystone and the former Storm team, to name a few, players play with built up emotion and the mental grind of wanting to play mistake-free softball to beat the more talented teams.

"You play that type of ball for one, maybe two games," notes Foulks. "But no team can go out and play like that for several games back to back. I believe we would spend lots of money to go 0-2 or 1-2 at 'B' World."

<u>Willie DeLuca Selected For "Special Award"...</u> Rick Linz Elected To Hamilton County Sports Hall Of Fame

Rick Linz, considered to be the finest shortstop to ever play softball in Greater Cincinnati, has been elected to the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame.

And in an unprecedented achievement for softball, sponsor Willie DeLuca, who is deceased, will receive the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame's 2007 "Special Award."

The two will be honored at the 46th Anniversary Program of the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame on Saturday, May 12th, at the St. Patrick's Knights of Columbus Hall at 7500 Fairpark Avenue in Carthage.

Tickets are \$20 per person, and include a catered dinner. For tickets or any other information call Tom Taylor at 513-831-1153.

Linz will be only the second individual from the softball community to be inducted into the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame. The first was Tom Taylor, a first team allcentury outfielder and Greater Cincinnati "Player of the Decade" for the seventies.

Taylor, who has been President of the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame since 2005, told the Softball News that Linz earned the honor as one of the top two vote recipients among thirteen finalists.

"Any member of the public or any of our committee members can nominate someone," explained Taylor. "We just need to receive a bio."

Taylor said the Hall's Executive Committee then narrows the nominees down to thirteen individuals. For the first time ever, the names of the finalists were printed in the Cincinnati Enquirer and the election of two individuals was conducted by email.

"In the past, all living members of the Hall of Fame plus all members of the Executive Committee elected individuals to the Hall of Fame," said Taylor. "But for the first time this year, the ballot was also open to the public along with our traditional voters." DeLuca, on the other hand, was nominated by Taylor and approved by the Hall of Fame's Executive Committee.

"Willie deserves it, not only for all he did for softball, but for all he did for sports in Hamilton County," said Taylor.

Like Taylor, Richard Anthony Robert Linz was a first team All-Century selection at shortstop in 2000. And like Taylor, who was named "Player of the Decade" for the seventies, Linz was so honored for the eighties. He was also a first team All-Decade selection at short during both the seventies and eighties, an accomplishment no other softball player has ever achieved.

Linz had the rare distinction of earning All-American honors with the Amateur Softball Association (ASA), All-World honors with the United States Slo-Pitch Softball Association (USSSA), and All-Pro honors with the American Professional Slow Pitch League. He made his first USSSA World Series appearance at the age of 22 with Savannah Cafe, and returned the Series in 1978 and 1979 with Greater Cincinnati Sports. He was selected to the All-World teams in both '78 and '79.

In ASA play, Linz' teams captured Major Metro titles in 1979 and '80, and the Mid-West Regional Championship in 1983. That same year he earned All-American honors at the ASA Men's Major National Tournament with Bushelman Construction.

In professional softball, Linz was named All-Pro in both 1977 and 1981 with the Cincinnati Suds. In 1981 the Suds posted the best record in the league, and finished second in the World Series.

Linz was named All-City nine times, and Greater Cincinnati "Player of the Year" in 1979. He was inducted into the Norwood Sorrento's Greater Cincinnati Softball Hall of Fame in 1991.

Linz told the Softball News he was "ecstatic" to learn of his selection to the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame.

"I saw some of the names on that ballot and I thought people might think they were more qualified because of their involvement with other sports," said Linz. "I just can't believe out of all those people that I was one of the top two vote recipients. I'm very pleased and surprised that enough people saw the article and would vote for me."

Linz, who is also in the Roger Bacon Sports Hall of Fame, said that his induction into that and the softball hall of fame "were real honors.

"But to recognized out of all these great athletes from all over the county who were on the ballot is such a great honor," said Linz. Linz will be joining some elite company. Other members of the Hall of Fame include World Heavyweight Champion Ezzard Charles, baseball's all-time hit leader Pete Rose, Olympic Archer Gold Medalist Darrel Pace, professional football Hall of Famer Roger Staubach, and former Cincinnati Reds owner Marge Schott.

"It's great to be in the same hall of fame with all of those people," acknowledged Linz.

Linz also said his election would be "good for softball.

"Softball usually takes a back seat to a lot of other sports like golf and baseball," said Linz. "I was hoping a lot of softball people would email their vote in to have one of their own elected to the Hamilton County Sports Hall of Fame.

"I want to thank everyone who voted for me," said Linz. "It seems like it would have been all that much harder to be voted in by email vs. through their committee."

Willie DeLuca, whose name was synonomous with Cincinnati softball, died last fall of an apparent heart attack at University Hospital.

The 58-year old manager of the family restaurant - Sorrento's Pizza and Restaurant on Montgomery Road in Norwood - was only weeks away from reopening the popular sports bar and home of the Greater Cincinnati Softball Hall of Fame.

In April 2005, the building had been gutted by a fire that claimed the life of Enrico DeLuca, Willie's father and the 82-year old founder of the restaurant.

DeLuca, who is credited with pioneering the sports bar concept, filled the walls of his restaurant with sports memorabilia. Sorrento's was frequented by many area sports celebrities, and DeLuca often entertained customers by balancing chairs, swords, bats and other objects on his nose. He donated to, and helped raise money for, a multitude of charities, and supported recreation programs and sponsored teams.

But his fondness for softball may have been his favorite avocation.

DeLuca sponsored competitive men's and women's teams in the mid-seventies. His 1974-'75 men's teams won back-to-back ASA Major Metro Championships and boasted several future Hall of Fame players. In 1976 his women's team achieved softball's ultimate prize, capturing an ASA Women's Major National Championship under manager Merle Williams. It was Sorrento's finest hour.

DeLuca accumulated countless softball trophies from sponsoring league and tournament teams, many of which were displayed in the back of his restaurant until he ultimately ran out of space to store them.

In the mid-eighties DeLuca operated an annual Sno-Softball Tournament, which was a fundraiser for the March of Dimes that attracted over a hundred teams each year and raised tens of thousands of dollars.

During the nineties, after then Softball Hall of Fame sponsor Hudepohl Brewing Company closed its offices in Queensate, DeLuca invited the Hall of Fame to move to Sorrento's, and it's been there ever since. And when Hudepohl went out of business a few years later, DeLuca picked up the sponsorship of the Hall of Fame.

The DeLuca family is proceeding with the reopening of the family restaurant, which will feature a large bar and dining areas, a game room and a Softball Hall of Fame room.

The grand reopening is expected to take place sometime in the spring of 2007.

Greater Cincinnati's perennial "B" power captured six NIT titles, a 5th place finish in the Cincinnati Major NIT, and a 9th place finish in the U-Trip "A" World, and claimed over 300 additional national ranking points - 1995 than they did in 2005 (1640). Still, one could argue that while they improved in their domination of the local "B" program, the team's regional and national standing slipped. Freeze/Easton fell from 1st to 2nd in the Great Lakes division rankings, and from 2nd to 5th nationally. They finished two spots lower in the "B" nationals, falling from from 3rd to 5th, and five spots in the "B" World, as they regressed from a 4th place finish to 9th. And now, with the departure of 2006 "Player of the Year" Mike Malesko and slugger Tony Sharkins, who led the team in home runs last year (78 and 60, respectively), one has to question whether Freeze's seemingly unending reign as the nation's most enduring "B" power isn't about to come to an end. But not to worry. Arriving to stop the bleeding are Jon Jamison (PRI), the 2005 "B" Player of the Year, whose power helped carry Freeze through the '05 season, and Donny Sikora, a member of the USSSA "A" World Champion Northwest Pipe team. Sikora is expected to help sure up what was a suspect outfield last season along with newcomer Ritchie Jones (EAP), a young speedster. Former team standouts Pat Phillips and Scott Stigers will also be back in a Freeze uniform once again in 2007. A sense of urgency seems to exist on this year's team especially among the veterans - that it's time to finally nail down that elusive "B" World title. And hopefully the veteran leadership of George Farris, Trevor Barth, Homer Matheny, Jeff Click and Bobby Noeth, can help bring that title home.

 π Manager's Comments: "Our strengths continue to be defense and chemistry. Pitchers Bobby Noeth and Trevor Barth are the key components to the defense along with middle infielder and rising star Rob Menke. We did lose some power from the '06 team, but in today's game that should not be an issue. With all the power we had last year, we still only hit two home runs in our first loss at the B World. It should make us more versatile. It will allow Jon Jamison to swing away more and give others the opportunity to fill in with power where needed. Our defense will be improved in the outfield with Donny Sikora and Ritchie Jones. Our goals haven't changed from years past. We want to compete locally, regionally and nationally. Our state titles, national titles and top ten World finishes show our progress. We are coming off two top five finishes in the Cincinnati Major NIT and want to continue to play higher competition to ready ourselves for the tough USSSA B World. Freeze 2007 will be most of the same characters with the addition of new and old talent. Pat Phillips, Jon Jamison and Scott Stigers all make returns from past rosters. Stigers played with Freeze in 1999, Pat Phillips in 2004 and 2005, and Jon in 2005, when he was named 'Player of the Year' and a member of the 2005 All-World Team. Donny Sikora comes to us from N. W. Pipe, fresh off an A World crown. He will add to a veteran line-up with experience and competitive fire. Ritchie Jones will add speed and youth to an outfield that struggled last year. It is

obvious that some of us are not getting any younger. It is important that the older guys realize the importance of this year. Younger guys like Rob Menke, Jayson Scott and Mike Canupp all did a great job last year. George Farris had the best year of the 34 and older guys. Jeff Click and I will be counted on heavily this year to return to the form of years past. I am confident we will be there in the end. It is a long year. Our goals are not so much to win every NIT, or to pack the stat sheets for post-season honors, but to perform and flourish down the stretch when the competition is the greatest. In the past, we have played better than expected at times and worse than expected at times.
